



Changes in income inequality by country, 1990 and 2014






D-indices for 10 basic opportunities , by subregion

4-5 TIMES HIGHER THAN IN HIGH-INCOME COUNTRIES

IN 2017

THE REGION ACCOUNTED FOR 43% OF ALL REGISTERED DISASTER EVENTS AND 68% OF ALL FATALITIES IN THE WORD





UP TO 35% OF THE POPULATION IN THE AFFECTED AREAS WAS LIKELY TO FALL BELOW THE POVERTY LINE AS A RESULT OF THE DISASTER
