Harness the power of public-private partnership

- Trained and equipped over 400,000 health providers in Helping Babies Breathe in 80 countries during 2010-2015.
- Train and equip additional 100,000 health providers in Helping Babies Survive and Helping Mothers Survive interventions, including early and exclusive breastfeeding in over 50 countries by 2017.
- Reach 6,000 facilities with trained and equipped providers in five countries during 2012-2016 and 10,000 facilities in countries with the highest neonatal and maternal mortality by 2017.
- Strengthen 13 professional associations in eight countries by 2017.

We have saved many lives by Helping Babies Breathe

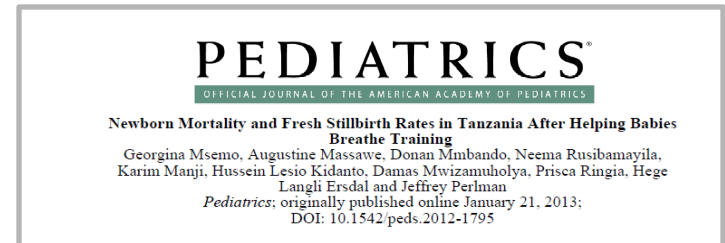


Studies in Tanzania, Uganda, and Nepal:

- Reduction in early neonatal deaths within 24 hours by 50%
- Reduction in fresh stillbirth by 25%

Global:

- Estimated 150,000 fewer deaths due to intrapartum complications (including birth asphyxia) between 2008 and 2013

Summary

Background Up-to-date information on the causes of child deaths is crucial to guide global efforts to improve child survival. We report new estimates for 2008 of the major causes of death in children younger than 5 years.

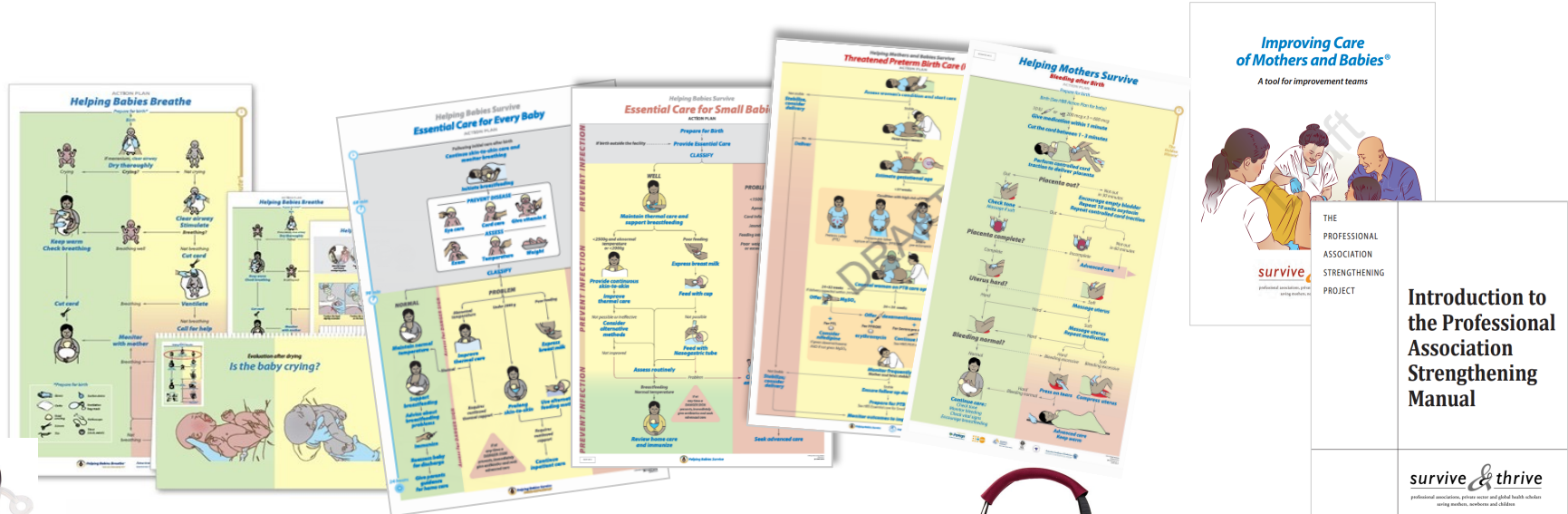

We trained health providers and strengthened professional associations

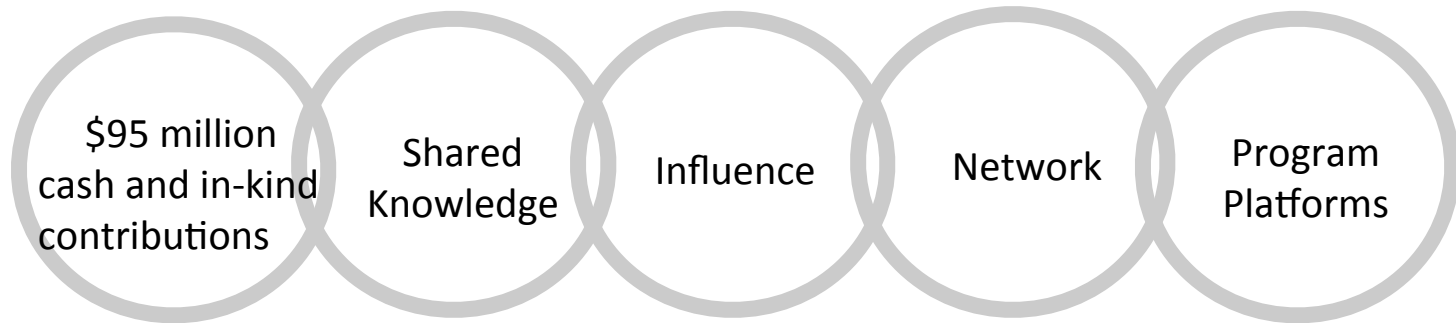


- Trained 400,000 health providers in over 80 countries
