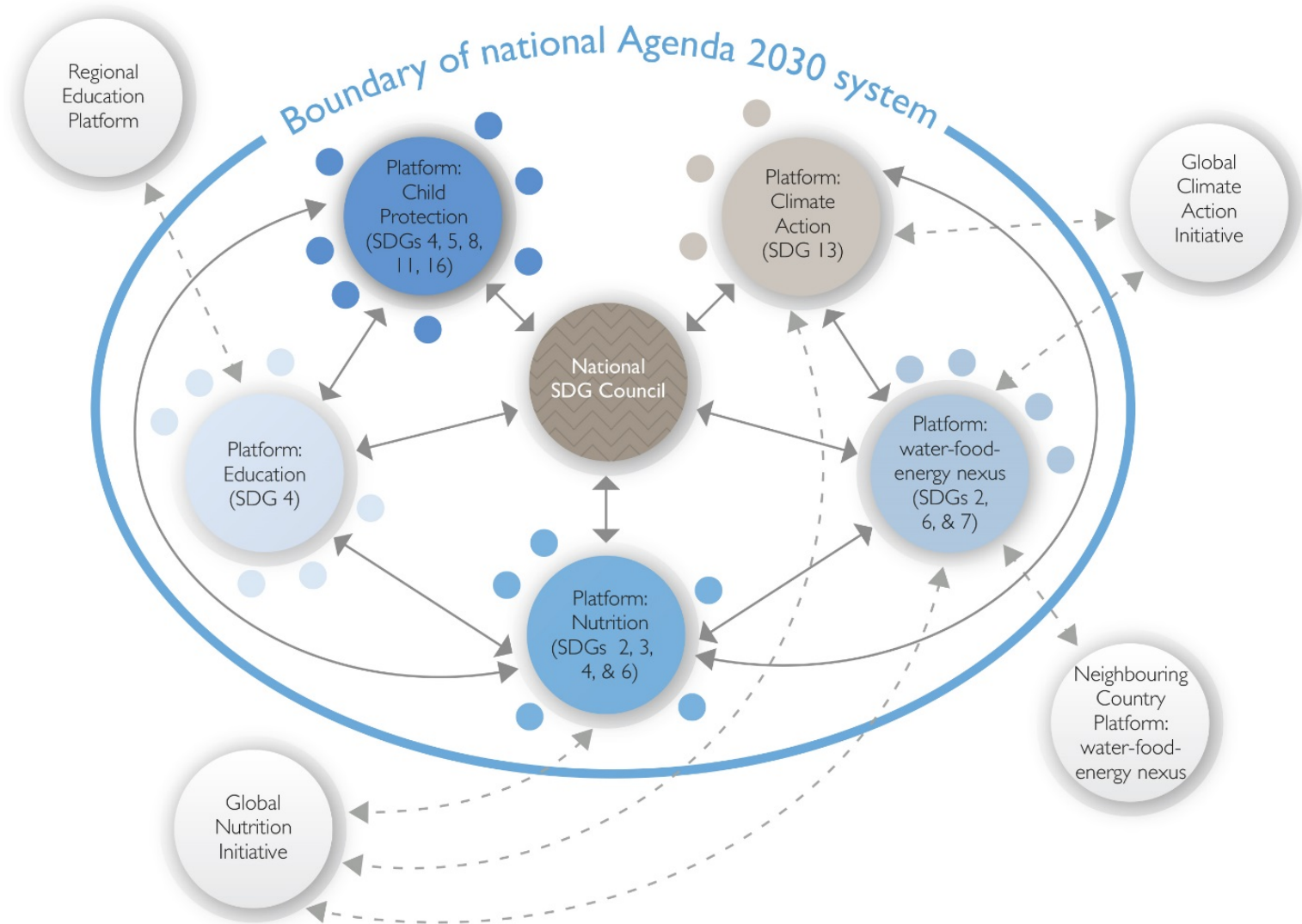
Role of partnership platforms

Partnership Platforms:

- *ongoing mechanism to catalyse collaboration for development*
- *convene government, business, CSOs, donors and other development actors around a particular issue in line with country development plans / Agenda 2030*
- *facilitate innovative collaborative approaches*
- *directly broker and support new partnering action*
