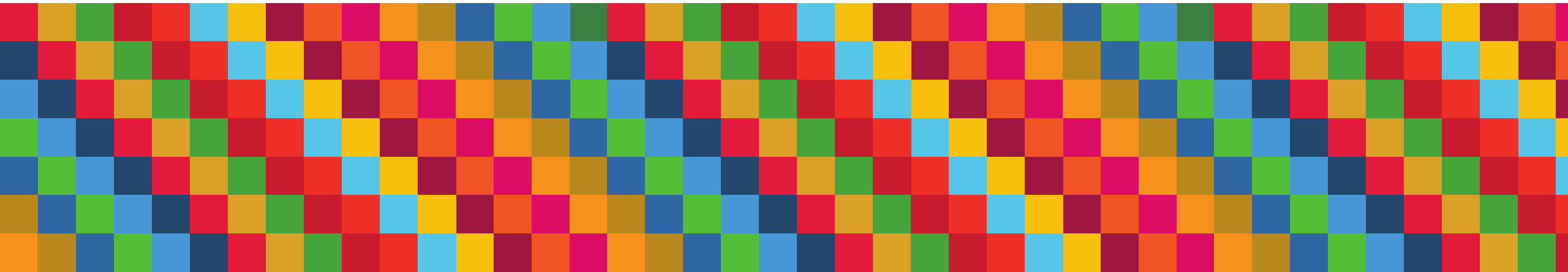

1. Conceptual framework – based on the SMART Criteria

What is it

Partnerships/commitments/initiatives that are:

- **Specific**
- **Measurable**
- **Achievable**
- **Resource based**
- **Time-based deliverables**

Where did it come from

Developed/adopted for:

- Rio+20 Voluntary Commitments
- SIDS Conference Partnerships
- The Ocean Conference Voluntary Commitments

Whats the purpose

- Increase transparency
- Spur follow-up by third party
- Increase networking

1. Conceptual framework – based on the SMART Criteria

What is it

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- **Specific**
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Example

- Name of initiative
- Full disclosure of all involved partners
- Target beneficiaries (countries, communities, etc)
- Description (Objective, coordination mechanisms, implementation methodologies, arrangements for capacity building)
- Start & End date
- Time based deliverables
- Resources devoted
- Contact information for follow up
- Linkages to SDGs and targets

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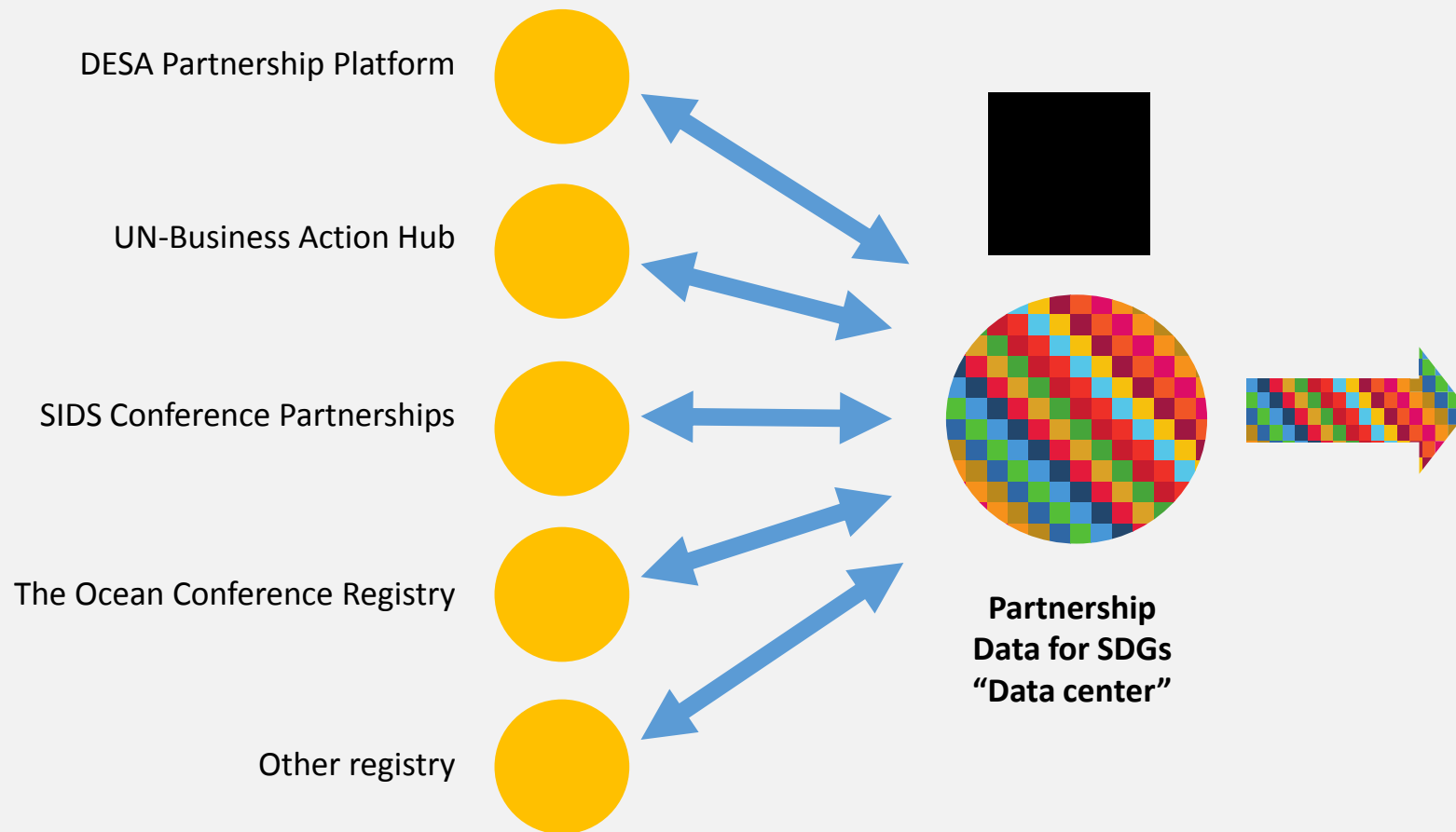
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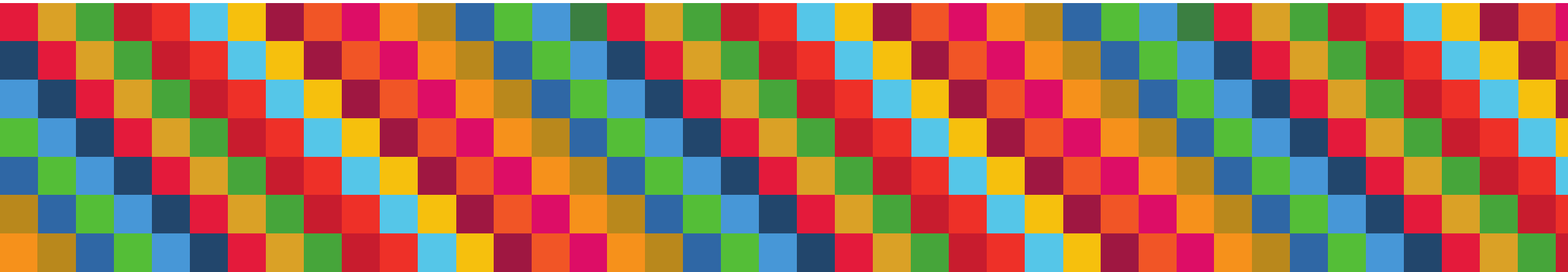
2. Operational/technical part



- Better comparability analysis
- More accurate reporting
- Less duplication
- Identify gaps among SDGs/targets and implementation
- Compliment review work of HLPF
- Better follow-up by beneficiaries

3. How can UN entities join/benefit

1. Adapt the SMART Criteria when requesting information on commitments and partnerships
2. Align information with SDGs and targets
3. Regularly share data with the Partnership Data for SDGs “Data center” – regular reporting to HLPF
4. Use the “data center” as a cloud repository and store/read using API
5. Utilize the “Action Network” set-up on DESA’s Partnerships Platform
