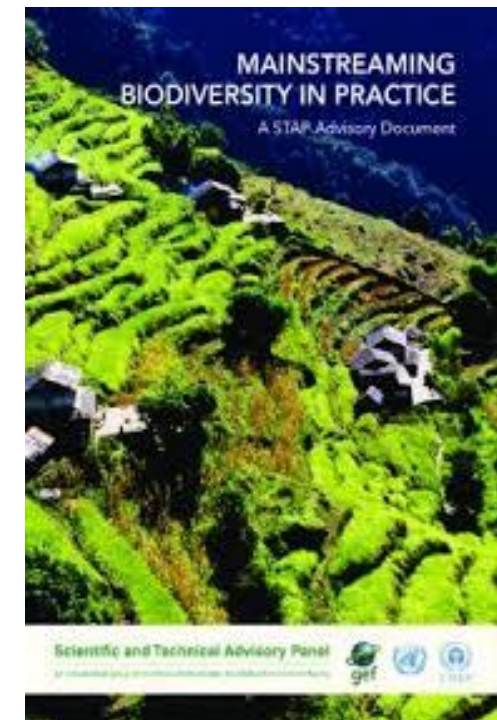
Focus on issues of common interest that help

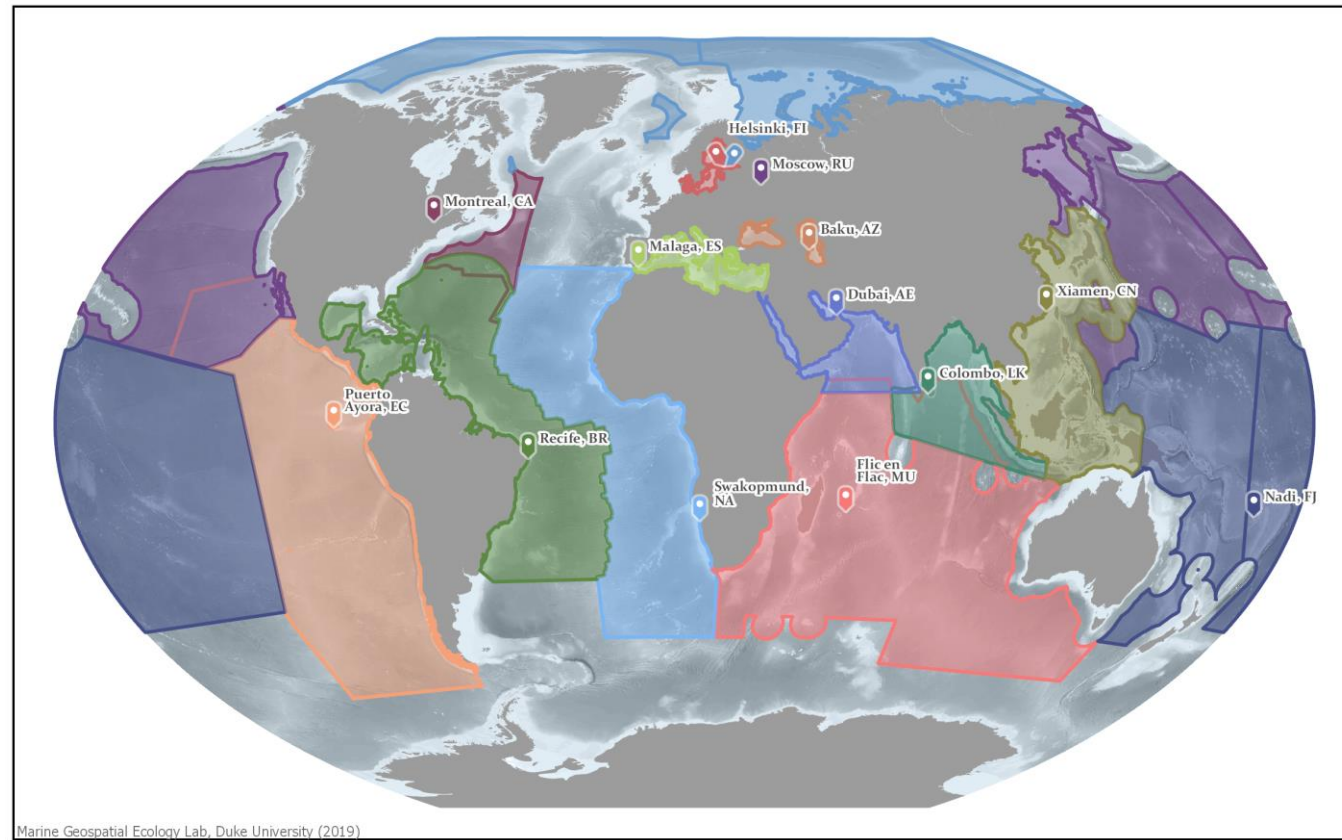
Synthesis of best available scientific and technical information

Description and mapping of areas that meet the EBSA criteria



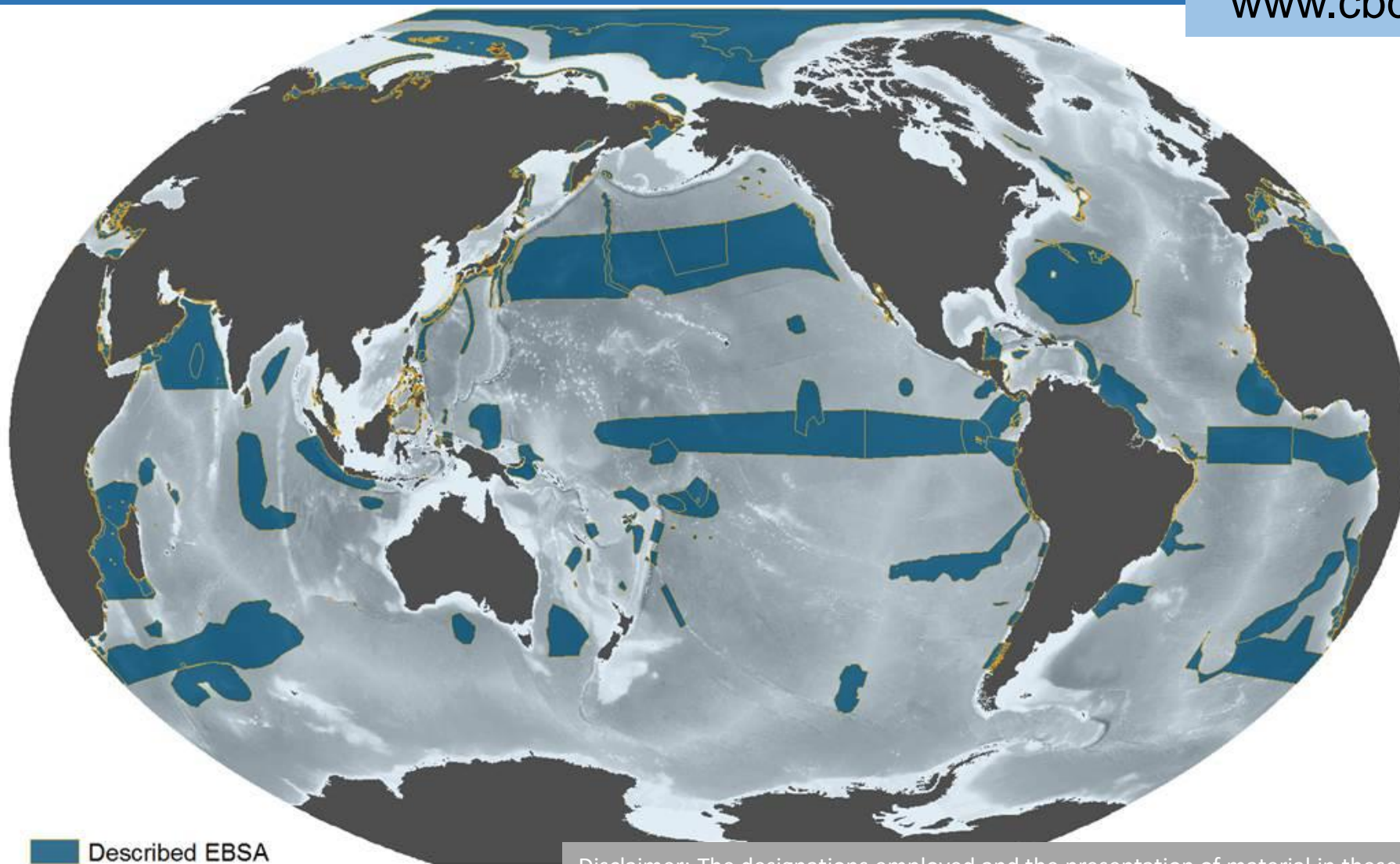

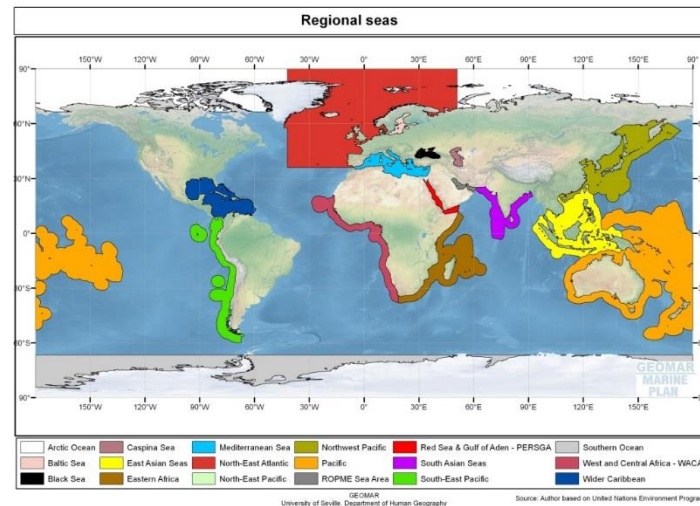
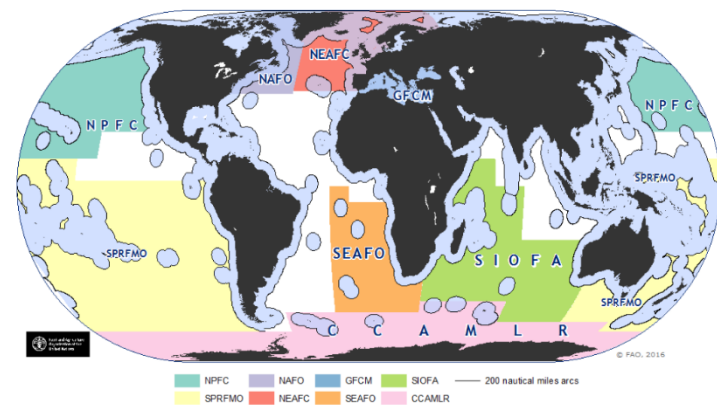

- 2020 deadline of the Aichi Biodiversity Targets
- CBD COP 15 in China in 2020 will:
 - Assess level of achievement of Aichi Targets
 - Outline the framework/agenda for post-2020 period
- Process underway now through:
 - Open-ended working group
 - Regional consultations
 - Thematic consultations
- Opportunity to learn from the lessons on Aichi Targets and SDGs

LESSONS

Collaboration needs to be structured around issues of common interest

Collaboration/coordination requires investment of time and resources, is often part of a long-term process and is based on mutual trust and understanding

Regional-scale collaboration/coordination on marine environment, biodiversity and fisheries provides promising avenue to facilitate improved implementation and reporting tracking of global targets
