Sustainable Development is also about normative prescription. It is about the movement. It is about the objective. That is why we have 17 Sustainable Development Goals.

Another face of Sustainable Development is the process itself. That's why so many stakeholders and countries had been involved to produce this important consensus on Sustainable Development Goals. But the problem is, that Sustainable Development Goals are too good to be realized. Because it is too broad.

The natures of Sustainable Development Goals are cross cutting, cross borders, and interdisciplinary. So, we need to focus on something that can trigger to realize these 17 goals in more synergic and effective ways, which would bring about strategic consequences.

In this context, I believe Green Economy, or Korean version Green Growth, is a strategic pathway to realize Sustainable Development Goals. Green Economy has a lot of things to do with Sustainable Development Goals. It has something to do with energy, water and food. It has something to do with health and life. It has something to do with sustainable infrastructure and innovation.

With great degree of linkage, it touches almost every aspect of 17 Sustainable Development Goals. So, if we do well with Green Economy, if we do well with Green Growth, we will be able to contribute a lot in realizing the Sustainable Development Goals. And that's why today's expert group meeting on Green Economy is so important. I really hope this important meeting evolves into a solid epistemic community for our sustainable future.

It is my great wish, through these ongoing efforts, we could contribute to better and strong governance structure to overcome short-termism, one of the biggest obstacles to achieve Sustainable Development Goals. We, as epistemic community, should encourage long term thinking and practices. We should encourage cross border cooperation as Sustainable Development Goals will be best met at global levels.

Again, I thank all of you for arranging this wonderful meeting. Let me conclude my remark by quoting the title of an article I recently read. It's about the interconnection between CO2 and Sustainable Development Goals and the title is "United they Stand, Divided they Fall'. So, let us make good coalition between Green Economy and Sustainable Development Goals for our common future.
